LUSITANO CLUB OF CALIFORNIA 30 Years of History 1984 - 2014

I remember vividly back in May 1984 attending my first field hockey match in the States with my dad Rigo in Marin County. It was an exciting day for many as some hockey players from Club de Recreio, Hong Kong were visiting and a friendly game was arranged to be played against the Macaenses in California that once played for Club de Recreio or another hockey club in Hong Kong for the first time. It was a great opportunity for many of the Portuguese from Hong Kong, Macau, and Shanghai days to reacquaint themselves and enjoy the sports that was so popular as they were growing up and see their friends play.

There were thirty or more enthusiastic players in their twenties to sixties that showed up on the field that day. Amongst them were Antonio "Toneco" Jorge da Silva, Tony, Joe and Mike Delgado, Tony and Gino Reyes, Pablo Oliveira, Eddie and Michael Vas, Vince, Lionel and Ed Guterres, Robbie da Costa, Vic Pedruco, Junior Remedios, Tony Barradas, and a few others that played for the California "Macaenses" team. They all seemed to have a lot of fun whether goals were scored or not especially since the newly formed California team "Macaenses" were not as well practiced as the seasoned Recreio players. Everyone cheered on for both teams as they had friends playing on both sides and I don't think it really mattered who won that day. It was just another opportunity for everyone to get together and have a good time.





After the game that afternoon, most of the players and some of the attendees were invited to a barbeque at "Toneco's". As the players had so

much fun that day, they could not stop talking about their next game. This thus led to the beginning of the "Lusitano Club of California" which was the registered name for the once "Macaenses" hockey team so they could play in the 1984 -1985 season under the Northern California Field Hockey League which required all teams to be a California registered club.

Why the "Lusitano Club of California"? The founding members



chose the name "Lusitano" for a variety of reasons. One: since many of their fathers were involved with the social club Lusitano in Hong Kong and Shanghai.

Another: as with all Portuguese people throughout the world, we trace our lineage to a spirited, hardy, and

tenacious Lusitanian. The Lusitanians were descendants of the Celts that migrated into the western Iberian Peninsula as early as the 8th century B.C.E. The courage and resistance they displayed in battle with the invading Roman legionnaires over almost two decades were legendary. Eventually conquered by the Romans "Lusitania" became a Roman province almost corresponding in location to modern day Portugal.

The constitution and by-laws of the Club, led by our first president, Arthur Britto, with 28 members set its goals to promote sports, and to preserve the heritage of the Macanese people. In 1986, Mario Britto took over the presidency and the Club continued to play hockey for another year. It was not until 1992 which really marked the rebirth of the Club when Antonio Jorge da Silva was elected as president.

It was during this same time, Thalia Prata da Cruz (Nuno's mother) convinced the officers of the Club to consider a more active role in the community. Her patriotism and determination inspired this change, and played a major part in the transformation of the Club. She offered the use of her building at 464 3rd Street in Oakland free of charge as the Club's hall and meeting place. She went as far as painting the Club's name "Lusitano" at the entrance to the building. (Prior to this, the Club

held its meetings and used the address of Ted Almeida's glass business at 1160 Chess Drive in Foster City. In 1996, when the Oakland hall was no longer available, meetings were held at various directors' homes or Maria Roliz's office on Market Street, San Francisco which then became the official address of the Club.)

On May 13, 1992, the Club's eleven directors formally signed into effect its By-laws and Constitution. In effect at this point the Club changed its image from a hockey club to a social, cultural, and sporting club which included softball and 10-pin bowling. These basic articles of the constitution were received with enthusiasm and a great sense of purpose. The club was to continue to sponsor sporting activities, and to start concentrating on the history, art, food, music, and other cultural aspects.

To build up our funds the Directors donated prizes for auction at the many functions held at "Toneco's" backyard in Los Cerros. As the hockey team and many supporters enjoyed the BBQs and Clambakes as early as 1985, the Clambake was adopted as an annual Club function in the spring of 1992. As of today, we are still using the special wok built for the occasion and enjoying "Toneco's" signature dish Ameijoas na Cataplana which he continues to cook for us each year.

That same year, "an informal picnic" was held at Covote Point, San Mateo and attended by approximately 200 Macaenses and their families with a softball game and lots of fun and laughter. Since then the annual Lusitano picnics continue to be a popular event with as many as 300 plus spanning 4 generations attending in 2012.

The Club also started hosting a Christmas dinner serving Portuguese and Macanese food free for all our senior members in 1992 for at least 10 more years before a nominal fee was implemented and the venue changed in order to accommodate this most attended family function year after year.

The enthusiasm and generosity of that early group really contributed immensely to the success and growth of the Club, and definitely its rebirth in 1992.

In 1993, the Youth Program was introduced asking members to "encourage their children and grandchildren to attend our functions" and in 1994 it was proposed that "our Directors should include the ideas of our younger generation when planning our events . . ." also suggesting that "we give some real thought to scholastic and cultural aspects . . ." The inclusion of our youth proved to be the success of our Lusitano Club which continued to grow. Many Directors of the Club in 2014 are the "youths" of those days.

By April 1993 the membership was 90 (excluding spouses). As "Toneco" had left to work in Hong Kong in the fall of 1994, Lizette

d'Almeida acted as interim President until Luiz "Ozzie" Ozorio was elected as president in 1995 followed by Eduardo Collaco in 1996 and Merlinde Brown in 1997. Other succeeding Club presidents include Philip Ozorio in 2000, Luiz Ozorio in 2003, and Nuno Prata da Cruz in 2009. For the years in between, I am truly honored to have been elected and served as your President for 14 terms and an active director and volunteer since 1993. As of present day 2014, our Club continues to grow with 850 members.

Committing to promote our history, cuisine and culture; the first Lusitano Bulletin was published in April 1992 with Antonio Jorge da Silva as our first editor. The Club felt that it was imperative that we continue to concentrate on articles in our bulletin which will educate our readers in the Americas as to their history and heritage. Informative articles aimed at improving our daily lives and establishing and maintaining a bond between the descendants of the Portuguese of every race and culture were to be included. "Toneco" remained as Editor from Hong Kong until 1996 when he proudly announced his successor, Michael McDougall, the new Editor of the Lusitano Bulletin. Mike dedicated his time as Editor for 11 years, 1996-2007, and sadly passed away in March 2007. In the interim, Ken Harper published the next 2

bulletin issues until Melissa Xavier & I volunteered to take over as the Lusitano Bulletin Editors in Spring of 2008. We then changed its format to a color publication available both in electronic and hard copy formats.

One of the early goals of the Club was also to have a place of our own. This was finally accomplished in August 2007 when the 3 USA Macaense clubs jointly purchased the Macau Cultural Center with funds given by the Macau Government in 1999. The Macau Cultural Center celebrated its grand opening in May 2011 when its renovations were finally completed. Today the 3 USA Macaense clubs have their individual and joint functions at the hall where Portuguese classes are also offered.

Over the past 30 years, we have well represented our Macaense community and informing other Portuguese communities of our heritage and culture at conferences and other events at U.C. Berkeley, San Jose State University, etc. We continue to introduce to the Portuguese community a sampling of our cuisine at our food booth since our first participation at the 1995 Dia de Portugal 19 years ago.

Lusitano Club of California has come a long way since its inception. It has grown significantly both in membership size, activities and services offered. We have always promoted and encouraged the attendance and participation of youth in our activities, and it is rewarding to see their involvement on our Lusitano Board year after year.

We now have several major functions that take place throughout the calendar year, and an ever increasing series of smaller, interest-specific events that attract different members. The Board of Directors of each subsequent year has shown care and dedication by offering new and innovative ways to not only attract new members, but also to keep alive the excitement within the current membership, the pride and loyalty to the club over the long term. The result to date is an activities calendar that struggles to find available time slots to the membership's benefit.

In concert with all the other Macaense clubs throughout the world, the heritage and culture of the Macaense people will continue to live on for future generations, the descendants of the Macaenses. With the continued support, interest and enthusiasm of our members, particularly our younger generation, all is possible.

PRESERVATION THROUGH GENERATIONS Appreciating Macanese Culture as a Young Adult in 2014 by Connor Carion (Age 18)

With constant technological advances and the rapid rise of social media, it's easy to lose track of who we are and where we come from. As a member of the Millennial generation, the very first generation to grow up with the internet, my culture and ancestral background took a back seat. Instead, as a child, I grew up watched and followed celebrities and their lives and wanted to mirror popular trends. Now, as a young adult, I've grown to appreciate and cherish

my background. The Lusitano Club of California and its dedicated members are critical to the preservation of Macanese culture, tradition, and timeless family values.

Some of my best memories are a direct result of my family's and my own Macanese pride, as well as participation in Lusitano events. One aspect of Macanese culture that immediately separates it from others is its emphasis on family. Whether that emphasis manifests itself through celebrations, casual gatherings, or food, I've grown up with a strong sense of love and support. To my family, tradition and frequent gatherings are essential. For as long as I can remember, I've gone to my paternal grandparents' house nearly every Sunday evening to share a meal (sometimes my grandma makes traditional Portuguese dishes) and spend quality time with my cousins, aunts and uncles. We have our own traditional ways to celebrate Thanksgiving, Christmas, other holidays, and special occasions. I find solace looking forward to these annual family gatherings. I used to take these family gatherings for granted - sometimes I thought they were just a little too long, a little too boring, or I just wanted to go home. However, now, as a young adult, I relish every moment and have come to realize that not many other cultures value family time the way the Macanese do. Unlike my family, some people only see their families occasionally. I attribute my strong family relationships to my pride in being Macanese.

The Lusitano Christmas Party has always been a great joy for me: a warm, enjoyable gathering of families eager to celebrate. I remember my feelings of anticipation and excitement as a child when I patiently waited to receive my present from Santa, not knowing exactly what I would get. Though I'm now too old to receive presents, I still enjoy the magic show every year. I find great joy in seeing the smiling, amazed faces of the young children in the audience.

In my junior year of high school at Saint Ignatius College Preparatory, my English teacher, Ms. Elizabeth Purcell, assigned a project titled "Child of the Americas." The assignment required me to interview or research the first ancestor or member of my family to immigrate to the United States (and of course write a paper and present to the class). At first, this project seemed like nothing more than a lot of work - however, it later provided me key insight that helped me learn more about myself and where I come from. Luckily for me, it wasn't hard to find the person I needed to interview - that person was my grandma, Patricia (Betty) Carion. For the first time, I sat down with my grandma at the dinner table and learned about her past. She shared stories about growing up in Hong Kong and the influences of her Portuguese heritage. Upon meeting, Betty and my grandpa, the late Antonio Carion, bonded over cultural similarities and eventually fell in love. They married and eventually immigrated to the United States to discover a better life for their future children. I learned about their hard work and sacrifices, and ultimately developed an entirely new appreciation for them. At the end of the project, Ms. Purcell explained to my class that though we work hard in school and in our extracurricular activities, we had done very little to earn the comfortable life we enjoyed. I thought about this for a minute, and eventually realized that she was completely right. My family is responsible for my opportunity. The sacrifices my grandparents and ancestors made years ago allow me to enjoy a comfortable life and pursue opportunities and education. The ability to sacrifice comes from a deep root in Macanese culture. Our immense value on family allows us to put loved ones before ourselves, even when it may be difficult. I hope to follow in the footsteps of my grandparents - I want to work hard not only for myself, but for my family.

For the past eighteen years, I've been a beneficiary of Macanese

values put into action. Now, as an adult, it's time for me to give back. Though it would be great to participate more in Lusitano events, it's difficult while balancing both school and a job. However, I've come to realize that there are little things I can do to promote Macanese values and preserve our unique culture. As a recent high school graduate, I am both nervous and excited to begin pursuing my undergraduate education at UC Davis. I start my first college classes in the Fall, and plan to work hard and always put in my best effort. I realize that not many people have the privilege of going to college -I was lucky enough to have a loving family that made sacrifices for me to receive this opportunity. Perhaps my tenure at UC Davis will allow me to connect with other Macanese youth and share experiences with them. I want to continue to learn about my culture, my family members and what it means to be Macanese in America. I've learned the importance of sharing stories and passing down tradition. When I start my own family, I will make it a priority to celebrate in the Macanese tradition. I realize the critical importance of strong family relationships, and want future generations to preserve this value.

I extend my sincere gratitude to the Lusitano Club of California for giving me a chance to earn money for my college tuition, and for their sustained efforts in preserving and cherishing Macanese culture.


THE MIRACLE MAN

Rick DeGraca was one of three honorees at the event. The first honoree was the CFO of Genetech and the second honoree was a cancer surgeon. Jim Bouquin, executive director of the Cancer Support Community, spoke of the first two's contribution in the fight against cancer. After presenting the two with an award, Jim spoke first about the Cancer Support Community, a non profit that provides free services for cancer survivors: counseling, support groups, nutrition, exercise and patient education groups. It serves over 2000 survivors and their families and is expected to grow exponentially in the years ahead.

Studies have shown, that everything being equal medically, patients that are active in CSC live an average of 18 months more. My boy Rick has again bucked the statistics.

Jim touched on Rick's family milestones, what he would have missed, if the medical professionals were right. Rick saw his daughter Annie give him his 5th and youngest granddaughter Madison. He saw daughter Toni return to teaching. He saw son Ricky graduate from college. Granddaughters Alexa and Haley started kindergarten and Amanda middle school. Ali received her 1st communion. He celebrated 41 years of marriage. When Jim was done with his talk on Rick, there were many teary-eyed individuals in the audience.

Jim was right. The CSC family has been a Godsend. However he did not touch on the love and support of Rick's family, siblings, and close-knit circle of friends, a fierce determination to live and most importantly, a strong faith.

The gala was definitely an enchanted evening. They successfully raised over \$400,000. Not bad for a nights work.

Recipes

VACA ESTUFADO A MODA DE MACAU "STOFFADO"

A recipe adapted for a slow cooker from my great grandmother's, Guilly (neé Ribeiro) Gutierrez's recipe as transmitted to me by my grandaunt, (Ricardina) Eduarda (neé Osorio do Amaral) Gutierrez

Ingredients:

Serves 6

- 3 lbs Beef Chuck Roast, Tri-tip or similar stewing meat (whole)
- 3 tablespoon thick soy sauce

Pepper and Salt

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large onion minced or 4 shallots minced
- 3 tablespoon tomato paste
- 1 can of tomatoes crushed or 4 med size fresh tomatoes diced
- 2 garlic cloves minced
- 1 cup of wine
- 2 cups broth or water
- 3 bay leaves
- 2 cloves
- 3 tablespoon thin soy sauce
- 3 tablespoon Lea & Perrins Worcestershire Sauce or to taste
- 1 lb carrots, peeled and cut in thirds
- 4 potatoes, peeled and cut in half
- Large frying pan

Large slow cooker

Large deep platter

Method:

1. Coat meat with thick soy, salt and pepper and let marinate for at least an hour. Remove meat and drain from marinade, but reserve the marinade liquid for later and blot the meat dry with a paper towel before browning.

2. On the highest temperature heat a large heavy pan and when hot add 3 tablespoons of olive oil. When the oil is hot, introduce the meat and brown the meat on all sides (this should take a minute per side or so). A pan with high sides is good for this to avoid splattering. Remove the meat from frying pan and set aside in a platter.

3. Over medium heat sauté onions/shallots in the same large heavy pan with the oil drippings from the browned meat; add a tablespoon of oil if needed. Sauté until soft and translucent, then add tomato paste until it caramelizes a little, then add tomatoes and garlic and sauté for another 10-15 minutes until the tomatoes break down a bit. 4. Place the tomato sauce base and leftover marinade in the slow cooker and place beef on top.

5. Deglaze the pan with a cup of wine/broth and pour over beef. 6. Add carrots and potatoes with remaining seasonings to slow cooker, and top off with water or broth until meat is mostly submerged in liquid. Slow cook on high for 2 hours, check the potatoes and carrots for doneness (test with a fork) and remove and set aside vegetables when done. Slow cook the meat an additional 1.5 - 2 hours until tender.

7. When the meat is done, carefully remove it from the liquid and let it rest for 20 minutes before slicing (resist the temptation to cut into the meat at this point). If you are going to serve it soon reheat the carrots and potatoes gently in the gravy (simmer, do not boil). When the gravy is hot, arrange the meat and vegetables in a deep platter and pour over the hot gravy and serve with a side of rice.

***It is sometimes nice to let all the ingredients marinate overnight in the refrigerator and serve it the next day. When ready to serve you may arrange the sliced meat, carrots and potatoes in a deep oven safe dish, and gently heat in the oven covered at 300 degrees for about 30-40 minutes until thoroughly warmed.

***If you don't have time to do all the steps just sauté the onions and when soft add the tomato paste, tomatoes and garlic and then just combine everything in the slow cooker for a pretty good pot roast. It's important to sauté the onions to make them soft before adding the tomatoes for two reasons: flavor development and the tomatoes will prevent the onions from becoming soft.
