LAEF Cultural Youth Summer Camp







In its February 2016 newsletter reprinted in the next few pages of our Lusitano Bulletin, we are honored that the Portuguese Heritage Society of California has published an expose of Macau that includes a recipe for Macau's *Pasteis de Nata*.

We are grateful that the Portuguese Heritage Society has joined us in many of our club functions over the years. We were especially honored by the presence of the Society's President, Antonino Pascoal, at the Macau Cultural Center where we hosted our Lusitano Chinese New Year dinner dance. President Pascoal will be joining us at the Macau Encontro this November.

Lusitano has participated with a food booth showcasing our Macanese cuisine in the Dia de Portugal Festival hosted by the Portuguese Heritage Society in San Jose for the last 18 consecutive

years. This is a premier Portuguese cultural event which at times has close to 8000 visitors. The Portuguese Heritage Society is also in charge of the Portuguese Historical Museum, open free of charge every weekend, located in History Park.

MACAU

Reprinted from the Portuguese Heritage Society of California Newsletter Issue 1, Feb. 2016

Macau is a tiny peninsula on China's southeastern coast, only 40 miles from Hong Kong. With more than 500,000 people in an area even smaller than Milpitas or only half the size of Turlock, it is the most densely populated region in the world. And it used to be a Portuguese colony.

Fifteenth and sixteenth century Portuguese explorers were eager to find routes to the Orient to take over from Arab traders who were taking spices, silks, and precious metals through the Middle East to Europe. The Portuguese went south around Africa, then northeast to India, and finally east through what is now Indonesia to China. The route was longer, more difficult, and more expensive, but the Portuguese advantage was military. They had better canons and were skillful in using them. They wanted to dominate maritime Asia. In 1535 the Portuguese obtained rights to anchor ships and carry out trade activities from the coast of China – Macau. In succeeding years they got permission to build storage buildings, then to establish a permanent settlement, and to form a senate to handle social and economic issues. The Portuguese paid an annual rent equal to the value of 41-1/2 pounds of silver.



The Dutch attacked in 1622, but their attempt to conquer Macau failed. In 1842 the British established a colony at Hong Kong. With much more area than the tiny Macau they were able to have even more commerce than Macau and thus more jobs. At this time Portuguese who needed jobs, began settling in Hong Kong and eventually traveled to the

five ports in China at Shanghai, Canton, Ningbo, Fuchou, and Amoy that were established by the Treaty of Nanking in 1842 between China and Great Britain. Especially Shanghai had a large number of Portuguese settlers. Some went to Japan and Southeast Asia. These Portuguese expatriates would update their movements, passports, marriages, and newborns to their respective Portuguese consulates as other Europeans did in those days.

By the Sino-Portuguese Treaty of Peking in 1887 the Chinese gave

Portugal the right to perpetual occupation of Macau. After a 1928 change in Chinese government there was a new treaty with friendship and trade provisions but no change in the sovereignty of Portugal.

World War II had a significant impact in Macau. Japan conquered Hong Kong where so many Portuguese were living. The Portuguese government – neutral throughout the war – gave refuge to the Portuguese by bringing them to Macau, providing housing, jobs, and schooling for the children. For some of these people born in Hong Kong this was their first contact with Macau, maybe even their first time to use the Portuguese language. After the war all these Hong Kong Portuguese went back to their homes and jobs in the less crowded Hong Kong. During the Chinese revolution of 1949 and with the retreat of the nationalist government to Taiwan, the Portuguese government of Macau once again gave refuge to the Portuguese living in China who did not want to live under the Chinese communist regime. However, some settled in Hong Kong. In the early fifties a majority of the Portuguese living in Hong Kong began to leave for Australia, Brazil, Canada, England, and the U.S.

After Portugal's Carnation Revolution in 1974 the new Portuguese government decided to relinquish all overseas possessions. In 1976 Macau was redefined as "Chinese territory under Portuguese administration" and gained much autonomy. In 1987 China and Portugal agreed that Macau would be a "Special Administrative Region of China", and China acquired sovereignty on December 20, 1999. China promised that Macau's social and economic system, lifestyle, rights, and freedoms would remain unchanged for at least 50 years, a principle of "one country, two systems". The economy is flourishing now, but some people were apprehensive and left, looking for other opportunities. Some went to other Portuguese-speaking places - Brazil, Angola, continental Portugal and to Australia, Canada, and the U.S.. Now only 2% of Macau is of Portuguese descent.

There are no statistics to determine exactly how many Portuguese



left Asia for the United States. With a sense of foresight the last Governor of Macau, General Vasco Rocha Vieira, created a foundation with grants to establish cultural centers in Brazil, Australia, Canada, and the United States for the preservation of Macanese culture. One, the Macau Cultural Center, is located in Fremont.

Every third year there is an *encontro* or gathering in Macau where people now from around the world come together for reunions and fun. The next will be in November of 2016.

Macau's economy today is thriving. Tourism is a major factor, not because of the humid tropical weather but because of the casino culture. There are more gambling places than in Las Vegas. The great church, São Paulo, is an attraction; only its façade remains after an 1885 fire. You'll find the street signs in both Chinese and Portuguese even though so few residents are of Portuguese heritage; 95% are Chinese.

MACAU'S PASTEIS DE NATA

If you talk about food to someone who has been in Macau, you'll immediately hear about custard tarts, that they are wonderfully delicious. Some families have secret recipes that they won't reveal, but we have a recipe for you to try.

Ingredients:

3 tablespoons cornstarch 1/2 vanilla bean 1 cup white sugar 1 cup milk 6 egg yolks 1 (17.5 ounce) package frozen puff pastry, thawed



Directions:

- 1) Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C). Lightly grease 12 muffin cups and line bottom and sides with puff pastry.
- 2) In a saucepan, combine milk, cornstarch, sugar and vanilla. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Place egg yolks in a medium bowl. Slowly whisk 1/2 cup of hot milk mixture into egg yolks. Gradually add egg yolk mixture back to remaining milk mixture, whisking constantly. Cook, stirring constantly, for 5 mins, or until thickened. Remove vanilla bean.
- 3) Fill pastry-lined muffin cups with mixture and bake in preheated oven for 20 mins, or until crust is golden brown and filling is lightly browned on top.

PORTUGUESE IMMIGRANT WEEK CELEBRATIONS MARCH 4 - 13, 2016

The Monument to the Portuguese Immigrants at Root Park in San Leandro, California, is the official site for the "Portuguese Immigrant Week". Celebrations began with a wreath laying ceremony at the Statue, followed by a reception at the Portuguese Fraternal Society of America corporate office across the street from the park. The sponsors for this year immigrant week were: The Consulate General of Portugal, Portuguese Fraternal Society of America

(PFSA) and Luso American Life Insurance Society (LALIS).

The celebration included Lusitano Club of California's bus trip to Cache Creek Casino on March 12. The City of San Leandro has been a staunch supporter for this annual event since its inception in 1967 when the then Governor Ronald Reagan declared it with a proclamation that the second week of March was to be "Portuguese Immigrant Week". In keeping with tradition, San Leandro Mayor Paulin Russo Cutter along with Vice Mayor Jim Proala and Council Member Lee Thomas presented the proclamation to Consul General Nuno Mathias. In 1966 the university together with the Diocese of Macau established the University of St. Joseph. Consul General announced that there are five 100% undergraduate grants annually available to qualified candidates. CHRIST THE KING CHURCH AND THE JESUITS IN SHANGHAI By Oscar Collaco

When I was seven (1945), I was invited to be an altar boy with and among many other students from Ste. Jeanne d'Arc High School, in the French Concession, that was run by the Marist Brothers.

After World War II, and the success of the Anti-Japanese War, American influence gradually penetrated the Shanghai Catholic Church, controlling both the seminaries and the important and well situated Christ the King Parish Church (French Concession) in 1945; and, steadily seeing to the bringing of many American Jesuit priests and nuns to serve the needs of the many foreign Catholics in this very cosmopolitan City.

The following are some of the names of the Jesuits that came to administer to Christ the King Church Parish: Frs. McCarthy (Director of the Jesuit Seminaries), Phillips, McCormack, McGreal, Houle, Gatz, Lennon, Brennan, Clifford, LeSage, and local products: Frs. Joseph Diniz and George Wong, under Bishop Auguste Haouisee, a French Jesuit and vicar apostolic who led the region from 1930 to 1948.

I also recall at Sacred Heart Church in the Hongkew District, opposite the St. Francis Xavier College, where the many Portuguese community resided, there was a Fr. Farmer an Englishman, and a Fr. Bolumburu a Spaniard, who had the sweetest high tenor voice.

At Christ the King Church, we had the best choir comprised of many Portuguese parishioners, of which a Margaret Diniz had a powerful soprano voice that needed no microphone. Also there was a Jose Sequeira who was the Sacristant at this parish. I must also mention two relatives: Jesuit Fr. Alberto Roliz, who later left the order; and, Marist Brother Ralph (Raoul Campos Maher) who taught both at SJA and at SFX.

After the Communist takeover in 1949, most of the foreign Orders were ordered to close and they were summarily expelled. The poor American Jesuits were either placed into house arrest, expelled if they were very old and sickly, or sent to harsh imprisonment and into hard labor concentration camp.

I met Fr. Phillips here at St. Ignatius Church San Francisco and Fr. Gatz at Southern California. I served as an Altar Boy at Mass Services officiated by most of the above mentioned Jesuit priests in Shanghai, before the 1949 takeover.

Christ the King Church at Rue Bourgeat, Shanghai, China

Located at the North-central section of the City in the center of the French Concession, servicing the spiritual and social needs of over 500 parishoners of foreign and local residents.

In the same church compound directly opposite the front entrance was the Catholic Federation, with kitchen



facilities, a spacious dining area, a library stocked with all the current magazines and periodicals from the States, a billiard and card room, and a very spacious patio overlooking a playing field where softball and volleyball and running areas for children with limited amenities of swing and see-saw and a sand box which was covered when not in use to restrict the visits of neighborhood cats. This was like a social Club where the Catholic community frequented after Sunday Masses, and in most evenings to plan meetings and social activities for the parish families. Opened when the American Jesuits took over the parish between 1945 and 1951. Brunch was served as well as short-order venues of the day. Tea, coffee, soda dispenser and beer were also available at very attractive costs, considering the difficult times during this period of post World War II, where most families were just starting to rebuild their lives. Sundays were the most popular days as after the five Masses, many came for the brunch or ordered their famous tasty shrimp toast with tea-sugar-milk or coffee. The 7, 8, 9, and 10 o'clock service took no more than 40 minutes. The High Mass at 11am with full choir, 2 altar servers and 10 candle bearers, lasted 1 hour 15 minutes; sometimes the homily took another 5 minutes. Benediction daily at 6pm.

A 100th birthday celebration! 100 years of accomplishment, one hundred years of living kindly and fully is an inspiration!



In a vivid account that covers from the 1400s to the 1990s, Antonio M. Jorge da Silva reveals the rich history of the descendants of the Portuguese of Macau. The evolution of them as a people – including their experiences in many parts of China, their resilience in a three-tier society, their loyalty to a country they had never seen, and their attempts to seek an identity they thought

they had – offers a fresh perspective on the history of the Portuguese in East Asia. For those who are interested in the endless possibility of "global local fusion", they should read Jorge da Silva's book.




