Our Visit to Portugal & Spain

September 30: We left San Francisco on September 30 to start our visit to Portugal and Spain. We made two stops before finally arriving in Oporto where it was now October 1. All thirty-five participants arrived safely via different routes and were happy and in good spirits to meet old friends and family. Awaiting us there was a new, huge, beautiful Mercedes Touring Bus and a smiling driver named Helder, and our tour guide Monica.

It was late afternoon and when we finally arrived at the Hotel



Vincci Oporto, as our wonderful bus driver was kind enough to take us around the vicinity of our hotel, so we could get our bearings. Monica was very knowledgeable and gave us a running commentary as we travelled along the bank of the Douro River. She explained the significance of this old historic area. On both sides of the wide river. "the original sites of the Port Wine warehouses, customs offices and other government buildings" still stood proudly. Originally, our hotel had been an open-air market that supplied the local residents and seagoing ships the provisions needed for their journeys into the Atlantic. The hotel was situated at the mouth of the river, which in the past was protected by forts and monasteries; their purpose was to deter pirates, and the French Spanish and Navies from

invading Portugal. Before dinner, we watched the sun set into the Atlantic Ocean, and the beams of a lighthouse illuminating the oncoming darkness.

October 2: We left after breakfast to drive to our first destination which was the Vista Alegre factory in Ilhavo. This 18th century estate has produced some of





the world most famous pottery, including trophies, ornamental awards, vases, and table settings that have graced the dining tables of world leaders and princes for 300 years. It is still family owned and their strict standards are in force even to this day. We saw the huge brick beehive kilns which

are original to the factory. Only the most skilled artists are selected to decorate the items with animals, birds and flowers.

These objects are then placed in the kiln to complete the firing. For generations, the local people were loyal employees of this factory, as it was the only source of work and housing. The color and clarity of

this extraordinary white porcelain can only be produced in this area of Portugal because of its unique local white clay.

We lunched at a very modern Golf Resort in Ilhavo, and some of us hoped that we had time to walk along the river, however, we still had many places to go that day. Next was the town of Aveiro, a city where every building was beautifully tiled, each one unique, and the red tiled

roofs added greatly to the visual display. In the old town, the Ria Waterways (canals) ferry passengers and goods to out of reach places. These long, low lying boats wooden (gondolas) which hold about twenty people are gaily painted and are a great tourist attraction. We traveled up and down the canals all the while listening to stories of the past. The crew of two, one the commodore who steered the boat, and Antonio the guide who also claimed to be a well-known "Fado" singer. He took a long handled wooden scooper out of a hidden cabinet and pretended to play the guitar. With a discreet press of a button, he activated the CD player that enabled him to sing and play like a diva. Everyone cheered and got into the mood and before the end of the trip



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we were all up dancing and singing; simple, unsophisticated fun at its best!

Next, we walked down a quiet street and entered an unmarked kitchen where they made Ovos Moles as the nuns had for centuries. Paper thin wafers resembling hosts are cut and filled with a mixture of



egg yolk and sugar. They looked easy to make but it appears that the secret recipe and handling are essential for the right flavor and texture. The chef said she ships thousands of boxes each year of these world-famous pastries. The local Portuguese are her biggest customers, however, and never get tired of eating them and giving them as gifts. It was a unique experience and the samples were great!!



Then on to Viseu, an elegant city of tree lined streets, fountains and shops. Within this walled city are some of the oldest churches and palaces (now museums). The city

has an aura of refinement and has a definite French architectural style. This cosmopolitan city has just about everything going for it and a far cry from when it was inhabited by ancient Celtic and Gallic tribes that traded in wild horses with the Romans. Christianity came early to this area of Portugal which has sustained human habitation for 2,500 years. Dinner and hotel Principe Perfecto that night.

October 3: We left Portugal and drove across the border into Spain. You could immediately see and feel the change as the beautiful freeways, wooded hills, well painted villages and serenity of Portugal was suddenly replaced by bumpy roads, dry grass fields, and a few squat

oak trees common to this part of Spain. If you were taking a nap you would think you were back in California. The area is renowned for its famous huge black pigs, who eat the black acorns from the above-mentioned trees and produce the best cured ham in the world. The strongest and fiercest bulls are raised here, too, costing millions of dollars; bred to grace the corridas of Spain. We stopped in Cuidad Rodrigo for lunch and then walked up the hill and into an old walled military base still protected by ancient cannons. The panoramic



views from the high hills were spectacular, the city down below, and the rivers merging was clearly viewed from the observatory and gardens. We journeyed on to Salamanca to the Hotel Sercotal Las Torres.

October 4: Salamanca is an old and beautiful city, and our hotel was just forty yards from the Plaza Major so it made it easy for us to walk and enjoy the huge square reminiscent of St. Mark's in Venice. Thousands of university students, throng there even after the shops and coffee houses have closed; the perfect kind of place to sit



and enjoy a glass of wine or coffee and watch the world go by. We went on a sightseeing walk with a local guide and began to understand the role that this city has played through the centuries. We were shown their newest attraction, Starbucks! But like most things in Spain, it did not open until 10:00am and we were usually on the road again by then.

We drove for miles on roads through towns and countryside before leaving the freeway onto a quiet beaten track. We were beginning to think our driver was lost as he went around in circles, but finally he stopped at the secret location of the restaurant. We still couldn't see any sign of a building in the middle of nowhere; but sure enough the



Bodegas Valcabaino in Zamora was there. It had once been an underground wine cellar and its roof is still a mound of sod and dirt. You enter a small wooden door, then walk through a dark tunnel and emerge into a dimly lit, long arched cave; you felt like you were in a different world. We all sat either side on a long wooden table and enjoyed our fine meal and wine. Another long drive awaited us, many napped before we arrived in Santiago de Compostela.

On arriving, we were driven immediately through the oldest and most important area of the shrine, usually off limits to buses, to an

ancient Franciscan Monastery. St. Francis of Assisi, himself, when he arrived on his own personal pilgrimage in 1215, founded the Franciscan order here. Since the 18^{th} century, it has been called the Convento de San Francisco. (During the Spanish Civil War (1930's – 40's) when the dictator Franco expelled all religious orders out of Spain the convent sat empty. Nowadays, its walls hold cozy rooms, the 16^{th} century

cloisters, ancient flagstone gardens, and the huge stone Comedor Monumental dining room that can accommodate 250 persons. Sadly, the Franciscan Church sits empty next to the hotel.

October 5: We took a guided walking tour of the grounds and monuments of the University of Santiago de Compostela dating back over a thousand years. You lose count on the number of churches, monasteries, hospitals and universities that have served the pilgrims throughout the centuries. Many precious relics of the past, such as the first fountain ever built there (it looked more like a huge baptismal font) where the pilgrims had to wash their hands and feet before they could enter the Cathedral and officially say that have finished the pilgrimage. We learned that up to three million pilgrims visit the Shrine of St. James each year from all over the world, third after Rome and the Holy Land. The noon mass was packed with people and it was standing room only for latecomers. The inside walls of the cathedral were lined with many open confessionals and it was wonderful to see students lining up for confession. The fondest memory I have is seeing a teenage boy kneeling in front of a white haired, ninety-year-old priest, and having such a long conversation. Both were smiling at each other at the end. Late in the afternoon some of us took the bus up

to the last station. In 1215, St. Francis of Assisi called this hill "The Hill of Joy," when he could finally see the Steeples of the Cathedral. From there we walked the last part of the Camino de Santiago pilgrimage walk back to our hotel which was a little over three miles. We felt that we had walked in the footsteps of Saints.

October 6: After breakfast, we were off again on another adventure, first stop Pontevedra a beautiful Spanish Coastal area famous for its cliffs, beaches and high tides that form

swampy marshlands, a hunter's paradise. We had a tour of the city before we continued to Vigo / Baiona the port that Christopher Columbus sailed from on his quest to find the Indies. An exact replica of the Pinta is moored in its harbor, and it is so small that you would think they must have been insane to try it. Along the beachfront is a monument to the daring of the crew many of whom lived in the area and were experienced seamen. There is bronze plaque with the name of the Captain and crew as well as murals and tiles are displayed on the walls. On site is the original big cast iron oven, still encased in cement that was used on board for cooking. This visit spoke volumes to my understanding of where it all started.

Next stop Ponte de Lima to visit the Roman Bridge over the river which enabled the Roman army, horses and carts to cross without using boats; it is still in use today. This area now is a favorite place for campers and boaters. Spent the night in Ponte de Lima and then left after a morning tour of the city, to retrace our steps back to Portugal.



Viana do Castelo, then to Povoa de Varzim, lunch in Guimaraes, followed by a long afternoon of travel to arrive in the beautiful Douro Valley. Being back in Portugal felt like home again to us. Our hotel was situated high on a hill that overlooked the river. The town on the other side of the river was

October 7: Morning sightseeing in



celebrating their annual festa in honor of Our Lady of the Rosary and have been doing so for hundreds of years. The sounds of music, dancing, laughter reverberated in the quiet air. The revelry finally ended about midnight with the setting off fireworks and it was such a

happy experience to share in their joy and devotions to Our Lady.

October 8: A morning visit around the area then lunch at Quinta da Pacheca Winery. We saw red grapes being crushed and learned of the process of winemaking from the family who has owned it since the 18th

century. We did not eat in the wine cellar because a group of Portuguese Government ministers and businessmen were conducting a seminar there that day, but none the less had a wonderful lunch in one of its private dining room. Maria, who is world famous in Portuguese circles worldwide, bumped into Portugal's Secretary of State of Tourism Ana Mendes Godinho and the Ministry of Economy Manuel Caldeira Cabral, both she had recently met in San Jose. They were happy to see her and were surprised too.

Two docile old dogs who live at the winery, and think they own it, checked us out and then proceeded to sit on the doorsteps and





we had to walk over them to get in and out of the buildings. The expression "Lucky Dog" must have been coined for them.

We had an interesting ferry tour up the river Douro and had to enter a large lock that was then filled with water to raise us up to the next level of the river. It was very interesting as it was much higher than the Panama Canal locks. Dinner that night in the Douro Palace Hotel and Golf Resort. Many people from all over Europe come to Portugal to play golf and enjoy the sunshine, good food and wine; and it is much cheaper than anywhere else.



October 9: Our last full day of the trip was very enjoyable as we stopped in Villa Real the site of the Palace and Gardens of Casa de Mateus, famous worldwide for its Rose Wine. We toured the beautiful palace which has been owned by the same family for about 8 generations. The richness of the furnishings, artwork, and fine treasures from all over the world fill its rooms, and the house has such a lovely flow that one could get used to living there, fast. The ornamental gardens are in the French style with low privet hedges groomed into every shape and pattern. Roses and huge trees grace the many acres of land and a large gracious lagoon frames the façade of the Palace. The family opened the house and gardens to small tours, and this with the revenue gained from the winery keeps it in pristine condition. In my opinion it is the loveliest Palace in Portugal; and as this was my third visit to Mateus, it just confirmed it. We had lunch in the ancient dining room, looking out onto the most beautiful garden, and ate the family's own rendition of Bacalhau/potato and cheese casserole. Yum!!

Now back to Oporto and

the Hotel Vincci Porto for a very nice dinner and to sleep until the wake-up call at 3:30 am.

International Institute of Macau (IIM) 2018 Identity Award Ceremony & Tribute by Nuno da Cruz

In departing from tradition, this year's 2018 IIM Identity Award which was announced earlier this year instead of being presented in Macau was handed out in California at the Macau Cultural Center.

On the December 2 ceremony, the award was given both to António Manuel Pacheco Jorge da Silva (Toneco) and Frederico Alberto Silva (Jim) for their contributions to the Macaense community. 1. About the Hong Kong Museum of History (HKMH)

Opened since 1975, HKMH is a public museum under the Leisure & Cultural Services Department of the Hong Kong SAR Government. HKMH has a strong team of curatorial and conservation staff, with some 40 museum Professionals stationing at our premises at 100 Chatham Road South, Tsim Sha Tsui, Kowloon, Hong Kong. 2. Major Collaborators in the Past:

3. Background of our Permanent Exhibition under Revamping:

Opened since 2001, the current permanent exhibition will be closed in mid 2020, and a brand new exhibition is targeted for completion by late 2022. The entire exhibition will cover a display are of some **7.000 square metres**.

4. Structure of the New Permanent Exhibition:

Two types of galleries, namely:

- **Chronological galleries** covering the 6,000 years of Hong Kong history in six galleries from the pre-historic times to the 21st century
- **Thematic galleries** showcasing some selected topics in greater depth, among which one of the four galleries is about the foreign communities of Hong Kong

5. About the Thematic Display on Ethnic Diversity in Hong Kong:

The thematic gallery on the Foreign Communities of Hong Kong will be presented in an exhibition series, starting from the Hong Kong Portuguese Communities, with each round lasting from a maximum of 2 years.

Scheduled for late 2022 to late 2024, the display on Hong Kong Portuguese Communities will come first in the series.

6. Themes to be covered in the forthcoming exhibition about the Hong Kong Portuguese Communities:

Family History Food Culture Trade and Business Social Life and Entertainment Sports Education Religion Public Service Military/ Uniformed Services

7. Examples of Potential Exhibits:

The Hong Kong Portuguese Community Artefact Collection Campaign has been commenced since April 2018. Up to now over 100 items of artefacts have been collected from local Portuguese by way of donation or loan-in to the museum, either from celebrities or ordinary people:

- Over 60 items from Mr. A de O Sales (photos, memorabilia, booklets, banners, etc.) about his contributions to Hong Kong's sports development and to the Urban Council;
- About 40 family photos from second-generation Portuguese Ms. Melba Patricia Correia;
- About 20 objects of Leonardo V. Da Roza (baton, photos, medals) about his contribution when serving at Hong Kong Auxiliary Police Force;
- Around 20 of trophies, newsletter, memorabilia from disc jockey Mr. Reinaldo M. Cordeiro (known as Uncle Ray);
- Over a dozen of trophies and memorabilia from horse trainer and former horse racing jockey Mr. Anthony S. Cruz showing his achievement in horse racing.

What are we looking for?

- Family heirlooms,
- Documents, diaries and letters,
- Cooking: e.g. Avó's recipes, recipes of ethnic foods origin from Macau,
- Religious objects, figurines and documents, e.g. statues and small alters, first communion and confirmation suits and dresses,
- Work places and employment: e.g. letters of employment, commendations for long service,
- Objects related music and entertainment,
- Sports: e.g. medals, trophies and uniforms,
- School certificate, textbooks and dictionaries (especially for Portuguese learning),
- Uniforms and document, certificates of boy scouts and girl guides,
- Documents, medals, uniforms and letters of commendations, diaries of uniformed services (e.g. the Volunteer Defence Corps & Auxiliary Police Force)
- Social: This painting is a wonderful rendition of the previous building of the Club Lusitano. We are looking for photographs of the outside of the building and the interior of the club premises,
- Racing at the Jockey Club: The Portuguese community has always been very closely linked with racing and the Jockey
 - Club, please if any members have any mementos like those for special occasions, for example Chinese New Year races, we would love to hear from you.
- Photographs and paintings: We like to get as many photographs as we can. The tentative plan is for the Museum to build a globe where images of our people in action are shown to represent the faces of the community.

Of particular interest are photographs of celebrations, baptisms, first communion, confirmation, marriages, gatherings during Christmas, New Year and Chinese New Year.

We look forward to hearing from you and your enthusiastic support.

8. Loan Procedure:

HKMH will sign an official loan-in-deed in duplicate with each of the lending institutions or individuals, and it will bear all the costs for door-to-door transportation and insurance coverage throughout the entire loan period. In case any conservation treatment is required for the objects, a treatment proposal will be sent to the owners for his/her consent before any conservation treatment will be applied to the loaned objects for the forthcoming display. After the end of exhibition, the objects will be returned to the owners in good physical condition. In short, all the related costs will be borne by HKMH.

9. Acknowledgements:

All lending individuals will be considered as supports to our exhibition, and their names will appear underneath the exhibit caption adjacent to their loaned objects, as well as the general acknowledgements panel at either the beginning or the end of the thematic display. Due credit will also be given at the exhibition catalogue, which is to be published at the time of the exhibition opening.

Supporters will be invited to the soft opening before our revamped exhibition is fully reopened to the public. The soft opening is tentatively scheduled for late 2022, and the full opening is planned for early 2023.

10. What HKMH need NOW:

HKMH need to confirm the exhibits so that the schematic design of the revamped exhibition can kick off in early 2019. Hence, measurements, photos and background information of the loaned exhibits will be good enough for the time being. Cheesecake *Recipe by Dorothy Oliveira*

Ingredients:

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups crushed graham crackers

¹/₂ cup sugar

1/2 cup melted butter

1 teaspoon lemon rind

Mix the above and press into

greased springform pan; set aside

5 (8oz) pkg cream cheese, softened

(Philadelphia is recommended, but if you've had success with other brands, feel free to use them instead)

1³/₄ cups sugar

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest

5 large eggs

2 large egg yolks

1 teaspoon vanilla

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 500°. Beat together cream cheese, sugar, flour and zest with an electric mixer until smooth. Add vanilla. Add eggs one at a time, beating on low speed until each ingredient is incorporated. Then add egg yolks. Scrape bowl down between additions (*I cannot stress this enough as if you do not, you'll end up with unmixed stripes of cream cheese*). Put springform pan with crust in a shallow baking pan (*to catch drips*). Pour filling into crust (*springform pan will be completely full*) and bake in the middle of the oven for 12 minutes or until puffed. Please watch your cake because some ovens will topbrown very quickly and if yours does that, turn the oven down as soon as you catch it. Reduce the temperature to 200 degrees and continue baking until cake is mostly firm (*center will still be slightly wobbly when pan is gently shaken*), about one hour more. Run a knife around the top edge of the cake to loosen it and cool the cake completely in springform on a rack.

Topping

8oz cream cheese 8oz cool whip

¹/₂ cup sugar

Mix together until smooth and spread on top of cake. Then chill it, loosely covered, at least 6 hours.
